

Area of Learning: Communication and Language

In all sessions children listen to stories/rhymes, take on different roles, and engage in a range of discussions – sharing ideas/feelings, debating, investigating, and exploring ideas/concepts. These activities provide opportunities for children to work towards the following ELGs:

Area of Learning: Personal, Social and Emotional Development

Many sessions specifically focus on helping children recognise and regulate their emotions and in all sessions, children play games that require them to concentrate and listen (to their adult and each other), take turns, follow rules, and respond appropriately to instructions.
